TABLE FOR THE EVALUATION OF THE RESULTS, EFFECTS AND IMPACT EXPECTED FROM THE STRATEGIC AREAS (THE EXAMPLE OF AGBODJÉDO (BENIN) REMINDER OF THE PRIORITIES OF THE STRATEGY: SEE WORKSHEET 5.

The table for the evaluation of the results, effects and impacts expected from the priorities was first and foremost useful in the evaluation of the results, effects and impacts expected on the reduction of inequalities linked to the first priority identified by each association. It was used to identify in advance the results, effects and impacts that could be expected, and their performance indicators. These 4 priorities have become the common gender strategic areas because they are the ones with the greatest and most desired impacts identified by the MA and the 2 WA to reduce inequities and gender inequalities at all levels.

In this table, you will find :

I. The following 5 results and performance indicators are expected from the gender strategy of the community organizations to be strengthened.

R1/ performance indicator: inequity disadvantageous to WA in the access/utilization of social, human and financial capital assets reduced by 10%

R2/ inequitable vulnerability in access to livelihoods strategies disadvantageous to MA reduced by 30 %,

R3/ inequity disadvantageous to women in the access to human and social capital assets linked to the structural excess of women's workload reduced by 15 %

R4/ inequality affecting both women and men in the area of decision-making on livelihoods strategies (capacity of women to decide to go and fish in the water themselves, and the capacity of men to decide to process and sell processed shrimps themselves) has transformed 5 % of the women and men in the community organizations to be strengthened.

R5/ inequity of negotiation and decision-making capacities disadvantageous to the women in the management of the community's credit structures brought from 80 % to 50 %.

II. The following 4 effects and impacts (and their performance indicators) are expected on the household of members of these community organizations as a result of implementing the gender strategy :

E/I 1/Performance indicator = inequity disadvantageous to women reduced by 30 % in the area of access/utilization of toilets, boats, fish smoking centre, stores ...

E/I 2/performance indicator = inequity disadvantageous to women in the area of decision-making on the equitable and sustainable management of physical capital assets of the community reduced by 30 %

E/I 3/performance indicator = human capital assets of women and men equitably strengthened for more sustainable exploitation of the fisheries resources by women and men.

E/I 4/performance indicator = 75 % of men and women beneficiaries of credit increase their profit margin by 25 % annually. The use of the profits by women and men in households should contribute to reducing the current inequalities that are disadvantageous to women in the household gender profile established.

III. The following 4 cross-cutting effects/impacts and their performance indicators are expected from implementing the gender strategy on the micro, meso and macro vulnerability contexts of the community organizations: The following effects and impacts are expected from the implementation of the gender strategies of community organizations :

E/I 5/PIP informed through the dissemination SFLP experiences and knowledge: sectorial and national policies on poverty reduction, women's promotion, and fisheries are better applied at local, meso and national levels (SFLP Outcome 6)

E/I 6/Ecosystems and resources strengthened (SFLP Outcome 3)

E/I 7/Economic and social benefits derived from small-scale fisheries increased (SFLP Outcome 4)

E/I 8/Capacity to participate in the planning and sustainable and equitable development of fishing communities strengthened (SFLP Outcome 2)
